Spring... Watch for migrating ducks, the awakening of frogs, and the many species of budding bushes and trees.



Summer... Look for summer breezes playing with the pond surface... Fish, frogs, turtles, ducks, comarands, osprey and more.



Autumn... Unlike most Cape Cod terrain, there are considerable deciduous trees and shrubs offering colorful New England foliage displays.



Winter... Ice, snow, shadows and occasional ice skating complete the cycle.

- 4) Lastly, have fun, get fit, and enjoy nature at its finest!



8-10 Miles of Trails.

Color Keyed Trails Cover
Approx. 50% of Available Trails with
the Balance to be Explored.

All Trails Lead to Known Roads
and Few Exceed 1 Mile.

Trails Are Maintained for Safe and
Easy Walking, but Are Left in a Natural
State. Please Be Aware of Holes, Rocks,
Roots, Uneven Surfaces, etc.

Depending on the Season, There
Are All the "Natural Wonders" of Cape
Woodlands Including Insects, Small
Animals, an Abundance of Bird
Varieties, Frogs, Fox, etc.
